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Dean's Letter

Dear Brooklyn AGO Members,

Greetings! At the time of this writing, I'm back in my apartment in New York, after seven weeks spent hiding out from COVID-19 with my family in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. The pandemic isn't leaving anyone unscathed-for some it means boredom and loneliness, for others lost earnings and economic hardship, and for others illness and death. We at the Brooklyn AGO send our deepest sympathies to everyone affected by this crisis in ways large and small, and we sincerely hope we can use our organization to make some positive impact in this terrible situation.

At this time, all the events we were planning to conclude the present program year are postponed indefinitely. These events are specifically the Members' Recital and the June Banquet; we also did not hold the Scholarship Competition that was scheduled for March. We hope to reschedule these events for late Summer or Fall of this year, but we aren't prepared presently to announce any specific plans.

Our Executive Board held its normally scheduled April and May meetings via videoconference, and we discussed ways we might address our current reality. We established that although we are a certified nonprofit organization, we aren't a charity in the strict sense, so we're not set up to make individual charitable gifts to members who may be in need. However, the Guild's National Headquarters is maintaining a detailed, regularly-updated list of resources for musicians impacted by the pandemic, which you can find at https://www.agohq.org/responding-to-covid-19. I highly recommend you peruse this list to identify any programs that may be able to assist you.

One area in which we hope we can help our members and fellow musicians is via online publicity, since the internet is currently the only public forum available to musicians. If you have a personal fundraiser such as a GoFundMe, Kickstarter or Patreon, or if you have any online content whatsoever you wish to distribute more widely, we're absolutely willing to share that info through our email list, website and Facebook page. We're also hoping to produce a virtual concert featuring filmed musical performances by our members. If you'd like to participate in this project, please reach out to me or Bombarde editor Nick Martellacci.

Finally, I want to take a moment to mourn the recent passing of organist and choirmaster Carlos Prescod. Along with his brother Roy, who predeceased him, Carlos was a pillar of Brooklyn's sacred music community for decades, and was closely associated with St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Crown Heights. Our musical world will be poorer without his gifts. May he rest in peace, and may light perpetual shine upon him.

Tips from Our Members

I hope everyone is doing well. We should all be in touch to help in any way if members become sick and/or are in isolation.

As for helpful practice techniques, I used a slightly different method to learn the difficult Bach *Fantasia in C Minor*, BWV 906, which I had to play on the harpsichord for one of our scholarship benefits. I practiced phrases one at a time until I knew each one well. Memorizing for me is easy and this helped. I then proceeded in this manner for the rest of the piece. Playing the harpsichord again after many years away from it caused

me some anxiety, but I was determined to play this for the benefit and I practiced it on the piano at home and on the harpsichord at St. Paul's. I was anxious, but less so since I had tested myself by playing phrases at random throughout the piece and picking up from there.

I know that others learn this way, and it depends on the individual to determine if this is a good way to proceed. What it allows one to do is to easily pick up the flow if there is any interruption when playing, and removes fear of getting lost when performing.

What other successful practice techniques can members share with us?

I hope all are well and stay so with physical distancing and masks, but it is even better to just stay home. We have many older members with comorbidities that make them especially vulnerable.

If you are staying home, have you found any good grocery delivery services? Most are so busy they cannot fulfill orders for 2 weeks or more.

Lutherans Go Online!

Like many of you, the last live service I played was back on Sunday, March 8. The next two Sundays I sat home I feeling like a nun at a nudist camp - not knowing what to do with my hands and knowing deep down I shouldn't be here. I did, however, keep up my weekly phone calls with Pastor Jeanne Warfield. The main topic of discussion was how to make online worship a reality ASAP. My homework included attending online seminars on licensing, planning an online service, and microphone sanitation.

As the big day approached, Pastor Jeanne and I along with our parish's in-house tech expert (Pastor's husband, Sheldon) scheduled a mid-week run through to work out any bugs. And there were bugs aplenty! When we finally connected my laptop to the Zoom meeting room with both audio and video, we decided that my electronic piano produced a more stable sound through the laptop microphone than the speakers on my Allen Quantum. The hour we worked was time well-spent.

On Sunday, Pastor Jeanne opened the meeting room one-half hour before the scheduled start of the service so that people had time to reconnect before the call to prayer. During the first two Zoom services Pastor made time for everyone participating to talk about how they and their families were dealing with the virus and life under quarantine. By the time Holy Week arrived everyone was comfortable with the new worship format. The graphics improved and Pastor had more time for preaching the Word.

The final innovation we made after Easter: Pastor sends me a list of hymns. I record them on both organ and piano. Sheldon then decides which format sounds best for each hymn, and records a group of local voices who sing along to my playing. The combined tracks are played during worship, the lyrics appear on the screen, and the congregation is invited to sing along at home with their devices on mute. (Singing along while unmuted would make the recorded music disappear as Zoom kept quickly switching to the most recently activated participant microphone. Not pretty!)

So, until we're allowed to open our doors, we're able to reach out to our parishioners and offer them communal worship. The parish is even offering weekly online Bible study.

Two points: Bishop Paul Egensteiner, who was consecrated as head of the Metropolitan New York Synod - ELCA in November 2019, authorized the Synod's picking up the tab for the Zoom license fees for parishes who decided to offer online worship. Requiring a password to enter the meeting has prevented interruptions from Zoombombing!

Licensing Issues: If your church is offering online worship you must purchase a separate podcast license on top of the print license you already own in order to print your weekly bulletins. An added benefit of this podcast license is that you can record your services and share it on your web site while the license is in effect. All copyright information for hymns used must appear somewhere on the screen. If you perform any music not in the public domain, you need to display title, composer, copyright information, publisher, and date of publication. Performers of any recorded music (instrumental or choral) must include artist and label information.
