Dean's Letter

Dear Brooklyn AGO Members,

Greetings! As we know so well from firsthand experience, the holiday season can be a hectic time, particularly for those of us with careers in sacred music! In our harried rush from one *Messiah* performance to the next this month, I hope we'll take a moment to reflect on the critical role we play in making the spirit of the holiday come alive for so many. In a society that certainly does not pay its sacred musicians their due, in financial terms or otherwise, it's important that we retain the conviction that our work is uniquely worthwhile. Live music during the holidays, performed in a spirit of sincerity, can bring communities together and impel hearts toward the divine in a way that commercial recorded music simply cannot. Thank you for your hard work this season!

I'd like to take a moment to update you on the Brooklyn AGO's recent doings, and draw your attention to some events coming up around the corner. This past Fall we hosted four events: a lovely tour of Brooklyn's historic Green-Wood Cemetery, a thought-provoking choral conducting workshop led by Dr. Dennis Keene, a far-ranging organ recital by Dr. Michael Kaminski, and a dazzling joint performance by the three winners of our 2018 George R. Mathison Memorial Scholarship Competition. We were pleased to welcome many new faces at these events, and we continue our efforts to encompass the entire borough of Brooklyn in our range of programming. If you're a chapter member who typically doesn't attend our events, I can't encourage you enough to show up in person! Face-to-face meetings between our members are the essence of our organization's purpose, opening up new avenues for collaboration and new ways of thinking about music.

Our first event of 2019 will be our January Banquet, an excellent opportunity to decompress after the holidays and spend some quality time with friends and colleagues in the Guild. The Banquet will take place at Enoteca on Court on Monday, January 14th at 6:30PM, and you'll find instructions for reserving a spot on the flyer included in this Bombarde. Then on Saturday, January 26th at 11:00AM, we'll host "Pedals, Pipes and Pizza" at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Park Slope, where children can learn about the organ and play it themselves, often for the first time in their lives. This years' event will once again feature demonstrations by Chapter members Ellen Wright and John Klauder, and food courtesy of our great city, the Pizza Capital of the World. Once again, please consult the included flyer for further details, and if you know any potentially interested young people, please send them our way! And for those who prefer cabaret-style musical performance to televised brain trauma, we'll once again hold our "Not-the-Superbowl" variety concert on Superbowl Sunday, February 5th, at the First Unitarian Congregational Society in Brooklyn.

These events are just the beginning of what is sure to be a busy 2019! Also included this Spring will be our 2019 Scholarship Competition, for which we're already accepting applications (full information is available on our website, www.brooklynago.org), our perennial Members' Recital, and much more! The Executive Board is grateful to all those who have contributed to make our recent events successful, and all those who are helping to plan and execute our upcoming events. Bach to Brooklyn 2019

For over thirty years, the Brooklyn Chapter of the American Guild of Organists has presented a Fall bus tour of distinguished organs in diverse houses of worship, called Bach to Brooklyn. Tour guide Andrew S. Dolkart, author of *Landmarks of New York City*, would speak about items of architectural and historical interest in the featured churches as well as in the neighborhoods surrounding them. A chapter organist or the resident organist would showcase the instrument at each location.

This has been one of the most popular event of the year with over thirty people in attendance, including many non-chapter members. Over the last few years, however, it has been increasingly difficult to get churches to commit an hour on a Saturday, for various reasons. Our difficulty finding suitable churches led us to refrain from holding the tour this past year.

So, for the year 2019, we are asking our members to nominate their own churches as Bach to Brooklyn destinations. Any and all will be considered. The date will be Saturday, September 14, 2019, from 9am to 5pm. If you think your church would merit a visit and would be willing to host us, please let us know what would be the best time of day for a forty-five minute visit. Please also let us know whether an additional hour would be available for your church to serve as a venue for our bagged lunch. Thank you very much!

Serving on the Board

I got my first paid organist job at age 16. After more than 45 years in the profession, I decided it was time to start giving back. (One of my organ teachers earned her AAGO; another his FAGO.) About four years ago I offered to serve on the Brooklyn AGO Board. I'd been solicited in years past, but a teaching commitment on Tuesday evenings prevented me from serving. When that job ended, with it went my obstacle.

The primary duty of board membership is attendance at the monthly Executive Board meetings, which are held on the second Tuesday evening of each month at the Baptist Temple in Brooklyn. Board meetings aren't held in July, August or December. If you decide to do more the opportunities are plenty – budget planning, calendar planning, helping coordinate one of the many events/concerts we sponsor each year, serving on the Nominating Committee, as Treasurer or Secretary, etc.

I've enjoyed my time on the Board. As my first term comes to an end I'm working with my fellow Nominating Committee members Paul Richard Olson and Jared Lamenzo to present a slate of candidates to the membership. The new members' term will begin in June 2019 and run for three years.

I hope several of you will want to help plan the future of the Brooklyn AGO by serving on the Board. If you're interested, please let me or one of the other Nominating Committee members know ASAP. We need to present the slate of candidates by the end of February 2019.

The 2018 George R. Mathison Scholarship Winners' Recital

On Sunday, November 18th, the Brooklyn AGO and St. Ann and the Holy Trinity Church hosted an organ recital by the winners of the chapter's 2018 George R. Mathison Scholarship Competition. The performers were third place winner Roshan Chakane, who graduated in 2018 with a master's degree in Organ Performance from Rutgers University, second place winner Evan Wesley Currie, who also graduated in 2018 with a master's degree in Organ Performance from Rutgers University, and first place winner Austin Philemon, who's currently working on a master's degree in Organ Performance at the Manhattan School of Music. Their wide-ranging program spanned the full breadth of the organ's literature, including music by J.S. Bach, Boulanger, Dupré, Messiaen, Peck, Reddy, Saint-Saëns and Vierne, all performed on the church's historic 1925 Skinner pipe organ. The performance raised money for the 2019 George R. Mathison Memorial Scholarship Competition, which will take place on Saturday, March 2nd, 2019 at 1:00 PM at Grace Church Brooklyn Heights.


- 1 What is your name (if like me it's not spelled out in your email address)?

I do not associate an unaltered 1895 Reuben Midmer with silent film accompaniment, but the forty-two rank organ and Rassan were up to the task. What a thrill! Skipping theatre organ convention, Rassan improvised in his own style an emotional accompaniment to this 1923 romantic/horror drama. Go listen and watch if he does this again.


