## The Brooklyn Chapter of the American Guild of Organists Late Winter, 2006

### ART — ARCHITECTURE — MUSIC

I am writing this having just returned from our chapter's annual Martin Luther King Day trip, this year to Philadelphia.

The first stop was Lord and Taylor, *née* Wanamakers, home to the world's largest functioning organ. The building, dedicated by President Taft, the center court, and the organ are all National Historic Landmarks, and the building itself is owned by a real estate conglomerate, so the fate of the organ is relatively secure, no matter who leases the space. Lord and Taylor pays the organist(s) and the curator, and the Friends of the Wanamaker Organ volunteer time and talent, as well as fundraise for its upkeep. They also run tours of the instrument, and our hosts were Wally McClean and Sam Whitcraft.

The group was split in two, to make it more manageable for going into the chambers (string division, and beneath the pedal, where the curators have a complete office right next to the piano played from the console) and the console (yes! INSIDE the console). We also had lunch at the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor restaurant opposite most of the organ chambers during the luncheon recital, played by Harry Wilkinson, retired Director of Music, West Chester University, West Chester, Pa. and St. Martin in the Fields, Chestnut Hill, and a student (from 13 to 18) of Harry C. Banks, who was organist at Girard College when the instrument was installed. There were others there, obviously enjoying the recital, which ended with a rousing improvisation for MLK Jr. Day on *We Shall Overcome*.

Girard College is a gem. The moment you drive from the rubble-strewn lots across the street through the gates of this neo Greco federal period classical wonderland of a recreated Acropolis, one is uplifted and inspired. The crowning achievement is the Art Deco-take on classic architecture chapel. What a room! It has some of the cleanest acoustics I have ever heard, and 5 seconds of reverb! It used to be more before acoustical tile was installed on the back wall in the 1950's.

According to Mr. Wilkinson, who gave me more than an hour of his time for this article, it was the architect, too, who chose Mr. Skinner as the builder. Others had wanted to put the organ in cases on either side of the pillars in the front (*ed. note: what else is new?*), but E. M. agreed to put the organ in the ceiling in a huge 40' high chamber that also acts as a mixing space before the sound goes down through the grille to the room below. It works spectacularly well, giving the instrument an ethereal yet clear quality that is stunning.

Keith Bigger brought reprints of the description of the chamber and organ placement from Mr. Skinner's book for people to read on the way to Philadelphia. According to host, Bruce Schultz, organist of Girard College, and who played a wonderful demonstration for us, said the aforementioned Mr. Banks, organist of Girard Chapel at the time, wanted E. M. Skinner to design the organ and insisted that E. M. voice the instrument in the room. The specification shows it, and most of Skinner's signature stops are there, as well as a late Skinner diapason chorus. The only change is the Harmonics mixture, which was replaced with a Moller quint mixture in the 70's, later greatly reduced in volume.

If I might digress for a moment, I'd like to mention E. M. Skinner's love of Gustav Mahler. Here was a composer who was a conductor expert at bring out contrapuntal lines. As a composer, he seldom used the massed forces of his symphony orchestra.

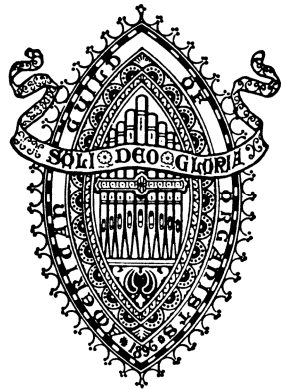
